

PROCLAMATION

We the Crow Creek Sioux Tribe Hereby Proclaim the months of February & March National Divest Months. The Crow Creek Sioux Tribe condemns the efforts to destroy our Nations by Corporate-Industrial processes that has invaded our National Territories and the future of our existence as we all know it. Furthermore, the Crow Creek Sioux Tribe stands United in our steadfast opposition to the Dakota Access Pipeline and similar projects that continue to jeopardize our way of life. As free, independent, and self-determining Original Nations; We pledge and commit that our National Treasuries, financial holdings, bank accounts, and other financial interests will be divested and severed from any and all banks, mutual funds, securities companies or other financial entities that invest in or otherwise financially support any aspect of the Dakota Access Pipeline and/or similar projects.

In the Territory of the Oceti Sakowin (Seven Council Fires) as Original and Allied Nations, we hereby declare and affirm our fundamental understanding of Mni Wiconi (Water is Life). We reiterate our responsibilities under our Seven Sacred Laws to maintain our balance with all ecological systems including: waters and all of life for the benefit of our future generations. Treaties are made between two or more nations, and they are agreements to develop strong relations. We enter into this treaty, as Nations standing together in common cause against a common danger, forming an agreement which invokes our ancestral and inherent rights to be free in response to this time of emergency. Treaties between Original Nations are sacred texts for making and maintaining sacred relationships.

We affirm, share, and maintain the legacy of a free and independent existence as distinct and Original Nations extending back to the beginning of our time through our oral histories, and traditions. We have our own languages, spirituality, cultures, ceremonies, our burials and ancestral remains, our sacred sites and significant and ceremonial places, our ways of child upbringings, political systems and economies, our sacred laws, as well as our knowledge and wisdom systems.

Whereas we view the Earth as a loving Mother, with her sacred waters, the system of domination unleashed on all of us, which has led to projects such as the Dakota Access Pipeline and similar projects, sees and treats our Mother Earth as nothing but a Commodity to be "Subdued" and exploited for financial gain. This exploitative dominating mindset, rooted in notions of religious and racial superiority, is a fatal path. Fortunately, our Original Instructions provide us with a way forward as Nations in a Treaty Alliance. For the Seven Nations of the Oceti Sakowin and other Nations, our Original free existence is our fundamental Birthright. It is a time for rekindling, for renewal, to protect our waters, our lands, in a powerful and unwavering manner. We are invoking the absolute right of selfdetermination in international law while calling for and to the Doctrines of Discovery and Domination being used against Mankind (Our Nations). "It is what we do this day that will make all the Difference tomorrow." Mni Wiconi (Water is Life).

General Council Meeting Fort Randall Casino January 12, 2017

<u>B&C</u>: Jody, Leo, Sam, Jason, Diane, Roseanne, <u>Absent</u>: Bob, Greg

<u>Call to order</u>: the Vice Chairman called the meeting to order at 10:17 a.m. there was a quorum present.

Invocation: the invocation was given by John Stone.

Approval of agenda: A motion was made by Curt Archambeau and second by Chelaine Knudsen to approve the agenda. (Tax Program-Annual Report and Election of (2) Commissioners (Lake Andes & Greenwood).

44 In favor and 0 Opposed. Motion approved.

Kathy Winckler: YST Tax Revenue Program Director: stated that there will be cash door prize drawings totaling (\$1,300) for the elders (60 and over) and food at the end of the meeting. Surveys were done back in October--on the percentages for use of the revenue.

Cash on hand: (\$63,763) in the tax revenue account. The reserve account for projects is (\$249,825.53) We have a public hearing every two years. Other revenue generated from fuel taxes, commercial land taxes

The top priorities according to the surveys are:

- 1. Education: (58%)
- Boys and Girls Club (youth activities)
- 3. Community Development-economic development
- 4. Elementary and Pow Wows (40%)
- 5. Land acquisition and maintenance (30%)
- 6. Tribal and Community (10%)
- 7. Other needs (5%)

I would like to have funded the Veterans and other entities. A big part of setting the percentages comes from having a good commission.

We have several options that will be proposed to general council to decide. (Leave everything the same) or fund (15) higher education grants at \$150 each. Tax program purchased athletic shoes for Marty Indian School students totaling (\$8,860).

Indirect cost (28%) and (\$44,000) pay roll taxes. The remainder of the funds are divided up after that.

Option B: Indirect cost (15%) (5%) to ICC. Dr. Garcia uses the funds for enrolled students grants (\$1,500) x (15) students.

Fund higher education students at DWU, SDSU and Haskell.

<u>Butch Hare</u>: what is the actual amount you get each year for the program--why not add MIS. The Tribe and Casino get a lot of revenue from the DTF (Dakota Trust Fund)--MIS is funded only by the BIA--they do not receive any impact aid. Why pay payroll taxes all the time, don't it come out of the checks--need to have a budget.

<u>Kathy</u>: we receive motor fuel taxes from the state-not indirect cost. In 2015 we received (\$40,000) from the state for the purchase of gas at the travel plaza. That is the only place we get taxes from. There is a general council resolution that mandates we use the travel plaza to purchase our gas from.

Elementary received (\$17,655.16) High school (\$17,655.16) Higher education (\$17,655.15 Support materials (\$17,655.16)

Butch H: MIS has to go out to seek funding and the Tribe and FRC don't have to.

<u>Doris C</u>: a memo went out to use the travel plaza for purchase of fuel but sometimes they do not have fuel on hand. The gas is higher there then in Wagner, and Santee. Who is the vendor for the travel plaza. Why can't we get something going --Santee has a better tax agreement than us. Indirect cost is what the tribe runs on-Doris gave an explanation of how it works-support costs, salaries, personnel, bills, supplies, telephone costs, etc.

General Council meeting January 12, 2017 Page 3

I am familiar with how the tax revenue program and tax code works. If elected I would be a active member and would follow the commissioner duties.

Gail Hubbeling: I believe in economic development--we need to get back with farming--I believe in fairness and accountability. The people off the reservation do not get any help.

Lake Andes Community:

Mario Kiyukan: I am a current commissioner and am seeking another term. There are a lot of tough decisions--but the commission is doing a good job.

<u>Shirley Arrow</u>: stated that she has been traveling up to Standing Rock closing out the camp but would like to be considered for the commission. My main point is to do everything in her heart for the people--and all the needs that they have.

<u>Chelaine Knudsen</u>: gave a background of her education and experience and that she would do her best if elected to the commission.

The Vice Chairman stated that the polls will be open for one hour. A motion was made by Kathy Winckler and second by Armando Iron Elk to keep the polls open for one hour (11:16 a.m. to 12:16 p.m.). 65-In favor, 0- Opposed. Motion approved.

The meeting was turned over to the election board.

The polls were declared closed by Deanna Gullikson, Election Board at 12:16 p.m. Deanna announced that the election board would commence to start counting the ballots--by groups of (25).

Greenwood totals: Basil Heth received (22) votes Doris Cooke received (39) votes Gail Hubbeling received (46) votes

Lake Andes totals: Mario Kiyukan received (36) votes Shirley Arrow received (8) votes Chelaine Knudsen received (55) votes

The election board chairman declared Gail Hubbeling the top vote getter in Greenwood community with a total of (46) votes. Chelaine Knudsen was declared the top vote getter in Lake Andes community with a total of (55) votes.

Option A: received a total of (49) votes and Option B received a total of (54) votes.

A total of (109) ballots were cast.

General Council meeting January 12, 2017 Page 4

A motion was made by Armando Iron Elk and second by Bobby Brown Bear to affirm the votes of Gail Hubbeling for Greenwood community and Chelaine Knudsen for Lake Andes community to the YST Tax Revenue Commission.

55- In favor and 1- Opposed. Motion approved.

A motion was made by Kathy Winckler and second by Armando Iron Elk to approve Resolution 2017-01.

53-In favor and 0-Opposed. Motion approved.

Kathy stated that we will proceed to have the cash drawings. The drawings will continue until it has all be given out--there will be opportunities for multiple winners.

The meeting was declared adjourn by unanimous consent.

Glenford Sam Sully, Secretary YST Business and Claims Committee

John Stone commented on the tax budget percentages (40%) goes directly to the kids, (30%) for land purchase, (30%) for tribal government. Indirect cost (\$44,000) I am in support of leaving the percentages as they are--taking revenue away from the non-Indians.

Kathy reported that he 2016 lease income revenue was (\$181,524.05). Jody Z: stated that in the beginning the BIA Superintendent Kitto was reluctant to do-implement the (5%) commercial lease tax. This is the strongest act of our sovereignty

Chelaine stated that she supports Option B (5%) goes to the ICC for scholarships-really assist students that have need.

Kathy: we will turn the floor over to the candidates speeches-we will set a limit of (10) minutes for each one. The communities that have vacancies are Greenwood and Lake Andes. We will start with Greenwood.

Basil Heth: I am the current tax commissioner for Greenwood-I read Title 16 of the taxation code on the general provisions. The funding can't take care of everything-but there is a lot of needs. The tribe exercises the sovereign right to tax-the tribe benefits from. The Salazar settlement can be used for education. I am requesting your support-and appreciate your vote.

Doris Cooke: I have been a Greenwood community member all my life.

Ihanktonwan Akicita Plan Memorial Day Honoring

Every Memorial Day, Veterans of the Yankton Sioux Tribe come together to honor deceased veterans on the reservation. The Ihanktonwan Akicita spends the day together visiting eight cemeteries: Native American Church, Hill Church, Holy Name, Lake Andes St. Philips, Cedar Church, Marty Catholic cemetery, Holy Fellowship Episcopal and the Greenwood Presbyterian. At each cemetery, there is an honoring ceremony that includes a rifle salute, Flag and Victory songs by the Rising Hail drum group and prayers by Akicita chaplain. General Council Meeting Fort Randall Casino January 6, 2017

<u>B&C</u>: Bob, Jody, Leo, Sam, Mona, Diane, Roseanne, Greg <u>Absent</u>: Jason

Call to order: the meeting was called to order by the chairman at 10:43 a.m.

Invocation: the invocation was given by Ron Sully.

Approval of agenda: discussion held on the agenda-(Amended Development Trust Fund meeting and report).

A motion was made by Clarence Montgomery and second by Ron Sully to approve the agenda.

Sharon Drapeau: question on emergency general council meeting on the pipe line (DAPL). It should come to general council.

In favor: 16 and 0 Opposed. Motion approved. With a quorum present.

Approval of minutes: the minutes were dispensed.

<u>Chelaine K</u>: introduced Ron Sully as the newest member of the DTF board-he is one of three new board members that were recently elected/selected by general council.

<u>Ron S</u>: informed general council that he was elected chairman of the DTF board-he will report to general council on DTF progress-there will be transparency in the DTF programdocumentation will be available at the office for the membership. Ron stated that he has a good understanding of how things run at the DTF-if you have questions, please ask. The other two new board members are Denise Brooks and Ethel Cournoyer.

<u>Shirley A</u>: asked why the By-Laws were approved by the B&C? <u>Chelaine K</u>: responded that the By-Laws were approved by general council and not the B&C.

Shirley asked about the limit (\$25,000 or \$50,000) that you do not have to go to general council on.

The DTF funds belong to the Tribe--why are you taking Indirect cost out--the tribe gets indirect cost from the programs--DTF is not a program and funds should not be taken for indirect cost--what are the funds used for?

<u>Chelaine</u>: it is used to pay for office space-utilities, accounting services, etc. In the FY 2002 Plan it allowed for establishment of an office.

<u>Sharon D</u>: how many stipends are paid to the board? <u>Chelaine K</u>: they receive one stipend per meeting per month-there are also provisions for special meetings to discuss change among the new board.

General council meeting January 6, 2017 Page 2

Jean A: responded to Shirley's question on assisting the FRC. A emergency general council meeting should have been called--there should have been terms and conditions put in but nothing was done. Reference made to rumors on funds sent to the FRC--again without general council approval. Discussion held on the indirect cost process and how the tribe enters into agreements with the government to manage programs. I believe the current IDC rate for the tribe is .30% or higher--it may have been capped at a lower rate. How much funds are remaining in the DTF?

Chelaine stated that it is in the presentation that she will be presenting.

<u>Sharon D</u>: what amount is it based on-monthly or yearly? <u>Art Standing Cloud</u>: it is based upon program budgets-(32%) indirect cost. Equipment is excluded (\$2,000)-along with consultant fees (\$30,000) and technical assistance-contractual. Of the indirect cost total-\$83,906 is deducted from the total indirect cost. DTF pays (50%) of the EDA Program Directors salary for grants. Chelaine stated that the EDA Director is assisting the USDA Commodity Program with applying for grants for the proposed commodity building. He is also working with the YSHA on a rehab project for the Dakota View Apartment complex. We had to pledge (\$30,000) as capital investment for the grant. The B&C will be applying for a loan for this and it will be presented to general council for approval.

<u>Shirley A</u>: I heard (\$400,000) was given to the FRC. What is the status of the plan. <u>Chelaine</u>: that's not true. \$1.6 million was given to the FRC-they do not have to pay it back. (\$4.78) million loaned to the Tribe for purchase of (800) acres of land--it was approved by general council--it will be paid back at (\$1 million) per year. You can call me at the office anytime with your questions. (\$2 million) is remaining in the DTF account.

General Council meeting January 6, 2017 Page 3

\$300,000 was applied to payroll \$1.3 million for debt (vendor outstanding bills)

\$5.78 million for purchase of (800) acres of agriculture land from Fischer farms (Lynn Fischer). DFT loaned the B&C (\$4.78) million was approved by general council. The B&C will repay the \$4.78 million back to DTF at \$1 million per year from Proceeds of Labor Accounts 701 and 704. There will be (4) payments made of (\$1) million with the final payment being \$478,000.

Sharon D: asked when the first payment will be made. Chelaine: the first payment will be made on March 1, 2017.

Chelaine gave a explanation of the budget line items--Personnel, salaries for her position, assistant- and (50%) of the EDA Director salary--he will be doing some grants for the program.

<u>Travel</u>: went to Lower Brule, attend a grant workshop in Wagner--traveled to Rapid City for training for office staff.

FY 2015-(\$180,190) the YST received \$30,000 for indirect cost.

FY 2016-(\$250,304) the YST received \$65,134,000 for indirect cost.

FY 2017-(\$253,800) the YST received \$51,906 for indirect cost.

Jean A: asked if the DTF budget was approved by the DTF board and the B&C. Chelaine stated that it was presented to the DTF and was approved and then to the B&C for approval. It was approved. We are presenting it to general council for approval. That is the process we follow.

Butch H: asked if the \$1.6 million came to general council. Chelaine stated that it was not in the by laws. Jean A stated that the constitution supercedes the by laws.

<u>Sharon D</u>: has a concern over the years that general council has to approve Made reference to a resolution that was passed by general council a few years back. It referenced that all funds come to general council.

Jody commented on the initial DTF plan-funds were not to be paid back. The B&C was the DTF board back then per general council. We followed the rules. I have not seen where in the constitution that it references the (\$25,000 to \$50,000) Sharon stated that it is on a resolution.

There is a live motion on the floor to develop a new plan--when is it going to happen? <u>Chelaine</u>: responded that a new board is in place--they will be meeting on January 26, 2017 to start the revision and prioritizing of the plan. We still have to follow the FY 2002 plan. Make sure general council was included in the by-laws--what funds were spent--we can't go after FRC to make them pay back the funds given to them.

Izzy Z: asked a question on Sharon and Shirley's comments on the funds that were spent with general council approval--find funds to replace it.

Lyle D: commented on the problem here at the FRC--we all know about it-general council needs to go after the former general manager for breach of contract (\$1.7) million.

A point of order was called-we are getting away from the agenda.

<u>Chelaine</u>: stated that she would like to start the power point presentation on the DTF annual report.

As stated previously, DTF provided the FRC with \$1.6 million for operations.
